

Master Plans guide the long-term development of our neighborhoods

The City's Master Planning process usually involves many years of community input, stakeholder feedback, and professional oversight. District Six is impacted by a number of these master planning documents like the **East Bench Master Plan**, the **21st and 21st Small Area Plan**, the **Parley's Way Corridor Plan**, and the **Foothill Drive Implementation Study**. Often these documents involve extensive cooperation among different agencies at the City, regional and State levels. This way, community members can be sure the resulting total vision is a product of thorough and diverse insight from friends and neighbors, as well as careful vetting by specialists and elected officials.


Master Plans and guiding the future of our neighborhoods

Smaller, more local area plans are also informed by the City's larger, comprehensive Master Plans, like **Plan Salt Lake**, the **Transit Master Plan**, **Parks and Open Space Plan**, and **Citywide Housing Plan**. In turn, zoning and land use policy, infrastructure improvements and upgrades, and private development all take their cues from this complete planning and implementation process, which often ends up spanning decades.

District Six is home to unique features that are further influenced by City agencies like Public Utilities and Parks and Public Lands. The East Bench's riparian corridors (areas where land and rivers and streams meet), and public lands and parks add another layer of planning efforts that impact District Six quality of life and quality of environment.

The **Foothill Drive Implementation Study** and the **Parley's Way Corridor Plan** are longer-term efforts with many stakeholders and participants. These plans involve collaboration between the City, Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT), Utah Transit Authority (UTA), the University of Utah, Salt Lake County, and other entities. The process of reconfiguring and updating transportation options and infrastructure on and around Foothill Drive and Parley's Way is expected to have major positive impacts on the surrounding neighborhoods over coming years. Many of the improvements in these plans are intended to enhance traffic safety and flow. The City Council adopted the Parley's Way Corridor Plan as part of the East Bench Master Plan in February 2017.

The Parley's Way Corridor Plan includes new street designs



Projects outlined in the plans over the next 10-15 years include a complete rebuild of Foothill Drive to accommodate safer and more effective mobility for cars and public transit, revision of land use policy to guide area development, construction of trails and other infrastructure to support bicycling and walking safety, and overhauls on Parley's Way. These and other facets of the planning strategies are expected to relieve some of the burden neighborhood streets experience as a result of heavy traffic to East Bench attractions like the University of Utah, Hogle Zoo, the Natural History Museum, nearby retail businesses and restaurants, and more. The Plans are meant to spur healthy development that supports locals and fits area character.

The **21st and 21st Small Area Plan** and the **East Bench Master Plan** take a closer look at the cultural content and community lifestyles of the East Bench neighborhoods, and how to best support residents through longer-term planning and preparation. These documents focus on developing neighborhood places where community members can come together and socialize, shop, eat, exercise, worship and get to know their surroundings. Through weaving key elements into the Foothill Drive and Parley's Way streamlining and rebuilding processes, placemaking strategies in these Plans will help community members continue to cultivate welcoming streets and unique destinations in District Six.
